Letter from The Bishop

I wholeheartedly support the rebuild project entitled 'All Things New' which will enable the Diocese of Owensboro to serve our young people for generations to come."

Western Kentucky is home to three universities providing on-campus spiritual formation for students. Regarding our mission and ministry to others, these on-campus ministries are very important and worthy of widespread support. St. Leo Catholic Church, the sponsoring parish for the Newman Center at MSU, has generously supported the Center and cared for the spiritual needs of students for many years.

St. Leo Catholic Church and the Diocese of Owensboro are conducting a capital campaign to rebuild the Newman Catholic Center.

The Newman Catholic Center should receive all of our prayers and generous support. Think of your gift as an investment in the spiritual lives of students. Currently, we have 5 religious, 3 seminarians, and 13 FOCUS missionaries who have come directly from the Newman Catholic Center in Murray. For this and many other reasons, the Diocese not only supports their rebuilding project through our prayers, but also through our financial gifts. I am encouraging you, who may read this, to be supportive and donate.

The cost to rebuild the Newman Center is \$1.75M. Rebuilding is necessary, as the current facility has long outlived its service. After months of study by the Buildings and Grounds Committee and Parish Council, the Diocesan leadership and I agree with the pastor and leaders at St. Leo that the best course of action is to replace the Newman Catholic Center with an expanded, modern facility, ensuring its mission of sharing the Gospel with university students.

The cost to rebuild is a shared investment for Catholics and parishes across our Diocese. The name of the campaign is "ALL THINGS NEW," a reference to Saint Paul's words to the Corinthians when he said, "In Christ, all things become new" (2 Corinthians 5:17). I strongly encourage everyone in the Diocese to consider a generous donation to this important project.

Vision & Mission of Newman Catholic Center

The Newman Catholic Center is a faith home for students away from home. Our mission is to guide young adults especially Catholic young men and women in the call to holiness while they live out their life as college students.

For students, the Newman Catholic Center is...

- A spiritual home away from home.
 - A place to pray, study quietly, and receive inner strength.
- A gathering place to meet and develop lifelong friendships.
- A community of support when your faith is challenged.
- An opportunity to find meaning and direction for your life.
- A place to receive and celebrate the sacraments.

Many MSU students have followed vocational calls to enter the Christian ministry. As of 2023, we have three seminarians, five persons serving in religious life, and thirteen Newman alumni who have served with FOCUS (Fellowship of Catholic University Students).

The Newman Catholic Center counts devout priests, religious leaders, Christian professionals in many fields, business owners, and community leaders among its distinguished alumni.

George Timmerman, pictured here with the President and the Provost of Murray State University, was a recent graduate of MSU and an active participant in the Newman Catholic Center. George gave the Commencement Address to his graduating class of 2023. Today, he is continuing his studies at Washington University in Saint Louis. In a recent interview, George said, "Thanks to the Newman Center, I'm oriented towards God, and that is the best thing that could have ever happened to me."



Brief History & Timeline

The Newman Catholic Center is named after Saint John Henry Cardinal Newman, who was an academic at the University of Oxford and a priest of the Anglican Church. When he converted to Catholicism he faced much opposition and lost many friends. He was a Catholic in the academic milieu surrounded by protestants...much like what many Catholic university students today face.

The first Newman Society was founded at Oxford, which focused on scholarship, unlike modern US Newman Centers, which prioritize social and evangelical activities.

1878

Newman Campus Ministry at Murray State University began with Father Mattingly's assistance, and by 1986, a building was purchased on the corner of 13th St. and Payne.

1962

The 1986 building was replaced with a double-wide trailer that also served as a nun's residence. In 1997, an addition was added to double the space, providing a chapel.

1994

The first FOCUS team joined the Newman Catholic Center to support and nurture the spiritual growth of Newman students. Student involvement and ministry continued to grow at Newman.

2011

After a student stepped through the floor at the Newman Catholic Center, Fr. McCarty began to build a case to present to the Diocese of Owensboro about the need for new building.

2021



The chapel has been too small for many years - it is often overcrowded for daily Masses, and will not fit even close to the number of attendees of a weekend Mass. People have knelt outside the door to the chapel at one point because there was no more available space inside."

As of Fall 2023, our Newman Center boasts its own chaplain, 125+ weekend or student Mass attendees at St. Leo, 68 students engaged in FOCUS Bible Studies, and 37 students participating in Discipleship. The increasing demand for meeting spaces has Newman bursting at the seams, with groups vying for space, especially during Bible Study nights.

A Turning Point: The Time Is Now

The Newman Catholic Center must be rebuit.

Here's why:

- The current Center is a 30-year-old trailer or modular building, and it's deteriorating.
- As a trailer, water has damaged it over the years and has rotted sub-floors and main floors.
- Replacing roofs on the Newman Catholic Center will cost a minimum of \$15,000 to \$20,000.
- Windows are inefficient, making energy efficiency impossible.
- Carpet and linoleum floors are worn and torn and need replacing.
- With non-functioning drains, major plumbing repairs are needed.
- HVAC systems, water heaters, and bathrooms are inadequate and need replacing.
- Meeting space for students is woefully inadequate and not conducive to growth.

When these costs are calculated together, the total cost makes renovation of the modular trailer costlier than it may be worth. Replacing it with a more permanent facility will ensure this vital ministry continues growing and reaching new students with the Gospel message. The time is now. The Newman Center must be rebuilt.

That urgency is what's behind our call to act now. With your generous participation, we will continue this ministry indefinitely into the future, sharing the good news of Jesus Christ and transforming the lives and future careers of many MSU students.

With these needs alone, the estimated cost range for repairs and replacement of systems is \$175,000 to \$225,000. This is based on current estimates for similar projects.

Additional concerns relate to the ability to operate and to enhance the spiritual experience for students:

- The Chapel's current capacity does not allow for the current students to participate. Newman needs to accommodate 70 students to meet needs now.
- The existing gathering space significantly restricts student participation in weekly programs and events; we do not have enough space to meet current needs. The objective is to expand its capacity to accommodate 100 students.
- The deterioration of the current facilities may quickly become unsafe for our students. Our goal is to offer a safe and welcoming space to continue our mission near MSU.

Now is the time to rebuild the Newman Catholic Center and make "all things new." This is our time to meet the overwhelming response from students wanting to participate in Newman Catholic Center events.

To be successful, we must have the generous giving of many and the extraordinary giving of a few.

The New Center will have...

- Expanded facilities and safety features to enhance the student experience
- 5,000 square feet of student space, or 150% larger than the current facility.
- Room for growth and participation by a growing number of MSU students.
- A library and meeting room, 65% larger for Bible study groups.
- A reinforced safe area for students during inclement weather.
- Office space for the Center's Director and FOCUS staff (Fellowship of Catholic University Students).
- Separate bathrooms for women and men.
- New, modern kitchen for friendship meals with students.

An <u>Initial</u> Giver is a person who decides to give for the first time, out of a response to God's Word about giving. (2 Corinthians 8:7-15)



A <u>Consistent</u> Giver decides to give something and to give it on a consistent basis to exercise the discipline of giving on a regular basis. (2 Corinthians 9:6-8)



An <u>Intentional</u> **Giver** is one who is beginning to think about their giving in relation to other things on which they spend their money. (Luke 14:28-35)



A <u>Sacrificial</u> Giver recognizes the cost that Christ paid on the cross for us and surrenders to honoring God with 100% of their resources as a result. (Colossians 1:15-18, 22-23)



A <u>Lifetime</u> Giver is known for thinking about the impact of generosity rather than just the shorter term of month-to-month generosity or even year-to-year. (1 Timothy 6:6-19)
